CVCC MEMBERSHIP MEETING MINUTES

December 14, 2021

Elks Lodge, Carlisle

The meeting was convened at 7:00 p.m. by Mike Bede, President, with a moment of silence for personal thoughts and prayers for Military, First Responders and our Country. Club members then participated in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Officers Reports

President: Mike Bede: No Report

Vice Present: Matt Bergemann, 1. New Member Readings: None

Secretary/Minutes: Sue Douville, 1. Correspondence: Received Thank You from PA Wounded Warriors for \$1,200 donation. 2. No correction to the November Minutes: Motion to accept minutes by Dave Walter and seconded by Paul Dagan. Motion approved.

Treasurer's Report: Mike Breen emailed treasurer report to membership. 1. Currently have \$25,029 in both checking and savings. \$15,514 uncommitted funds; zero credit card debt and \$8,265 reserved funds. 2. \$300 was allocated to the Toys for Tots party of which \$215 was spent. 3. Paid \$3,660 to NCCC for renewal dues. 181 members renewed; 11 are carry-over from 2021, for a total of 192 members for 2022. Club received \$1,545 in dues. Motion to accept treasurer's report by Anthony Chilbert and seconded by Gary Wolf. Motion approved.

Governor's Report: Sarah Bede – Renewal entry to NCCC has been completed and you should have received an electronic renewal card via email. Hard copy will follow in mail by end of January-mid February.

Standing Reports

Newsletter: Stoy Lokar 1. Sent out survey to members and received 25 responses. 85% read the newsletter. Please, if you haven't yet, complete the short survey. Also sent out a questionnaire regarding members' cars; received 22 cars (16 responses). The average car year is a 2001; most cars are C6 and C7. 2 top colors are red and silver. 1 out of 4 have a nickname. 2 out of 3 have a personalized plate. 85% were bought used. Average odometer reading is 35,000. Average miles driven a year is 1500.

Cruises: Tom Mitchel – No Report

Charity Report: Barb Breen – 1. Donations have been delivered to Family Life Center and received a Thank You letter from them. Their clients will be so thankful for these donations. Thank you to all who donated obviously a very worthy cause. 2. The board allotted \$8000 towards 2021 charity donations. \$6000 came out of our general fund and \$2000 was raised at the H&H Show. The Charity Committee recommends the following 13 charities to receive donations: \$1000 to Elks Visiting Nurses; \$1000 New Hope Ministries; \$1000 Mission 22; \$500 Project Share; \$500 Central PA Food Bank; \$500 Suicide Prevention Alliance; \$500 Pink Hands of Hope; \$500 Gemma's Angels; \$500 Warm the Children; \$500 Community Cares; \$500 Chip Miller Foundation; \$500 Vicki's Angels and \$500 She's Someone's Daughter. Several of these charities were





recommended by members and awarded a donation. More information will be in the newsletter. Sally Walter made a motion to accept the list as stated and seconded by Dave Walter. Motion approved. Thank you from the Charity Committee, which includes Shelby Gutshall, Sue Douville, Sarah Bede and Joann Binker, for making recommendations received from members and also for participating in the events to raise funds and the drive. \$1200 was also raised for the PA Wounded Warriors at the Hot Wheels Event and \$1,900 for Wreaths Across America. 3. We would like to ask membership to approve a donation for disaster relief in Kentucky. In the past we had given donations. Treasurer verified the club has the money for this donation. We've used the following charities in the past: UMCOR, Mennonite and Catholic Charities. The money donated to them all goes to the disaster designated. Motion to approve \$500 to each of the 3 charities mentioned above by Teresa Baker and seconded by Lynn Probst. Motion approved. Thank you to club; we are a very generous club.


Looking forward to many more Corvette memories in the future with my lovely, understanding wife and CVCC.



- Start at the old Deer Lodge, south of Mt Holly, heading south on Rt 34.

- Turn right onto Peach Glen Rd. at Goodyear, stay right on Coon Rd, turn right onto Wenksville Rd.

PUMPKIN PIE HUMMUS - A big hit at the Toys for Tots gathering

- 1 -15 oz can chick peas (rinsed & drained)
- 1 1/4 cup canned pumpkin (NOT pie mix)
- 1/4 cup almond butter (like peanut butter, but almond)
- 2 1/2 tsp pumpkin pie spice
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 1/4 cup real maple syrup



Put all in food processor and purée until smooth, stirring occasionally. Refrigerate. (Depending on your processor, you can double it but, instead, I make one batch at a time as it's tough on the machine due to the density). As with pie, it's better made a day or so in advance for the best flavor. Serve with graham crackers for dipping. Enjoy!

ROASTED CHICKEN WILD RICE SOUP – A winter favorite with the Lokars

1 – 6 oz box Uncle Ben's Long Grain & Wild Rice

Cook following package directions & *set aside*.

- 1 T olive oil
- 1 1/2 c chopped red onion
- 1 c chopped celery
- 1 c chopped carrots
- 2 crushed garlic cloves



Heat oil and saute all together til onions are soft.

1 – 8 oz package fresh mushrooms, halved & sliced

Add to sauteed veggies and cook thoroughly.

- 1/4 c flour
- 1/2 t dried tarragon
- 1/4 t dried thyme

Stir into veggie mixture, stirring frequently 1-2 mins.

- 2 c water
- 2 T dry cooking sherry or dry marsala
- 1 qt chicken broth


Add to above, mixing well. Boil, then simmer 20 mins.

- 1 – 12 oz can evaporated milk
- 3 c shredded/chopped roasted chicken

Stir into above, adding the cooked rice. Heat through.
